The Art of Telling Your Story: Practising Embodied Narrative

Tuesdays, 6:15 – 8:15 p.m., *Six Weeks*, *January* 16 – *February 20*, 2024, *Atwater* Instructor Matte Downey, whose latest book, *Go Wide: Reimagining the Landscape of Theology* was launched at TMI last spring, is offering a fascinating workshop this winter that focuses on self-expression through embodiment and narrative. Students will study the components of a monologue, engage in movement and voice exercises, and practice creating, editing, and presenting their own narrative within a supportive communal setting.

Women's Poetry: Six Poets in Six Weeks

Wednesdays, 6:15 – 8:15 p.m., Six Weeks, January 17 – February 21, 2024, Online Imogen Brian and Claire English are back with their very popular winter course on women's poetry. This year they will be looking at the work of six poets, one per session: Emily Dickinson, Anne Carson, Ellen Welcker , and more. The course will look at their work, asking to what extent women's lives shape their poetic output. Are there ways they take up language that are especially "gendered"? Or does poetic language transcend any simple question of gender? This course is open to persons of all genders, and one need not have taken previous courses in this series to participate.


Tuesdays, 1:30 – 3:30 p.m., Eight Weeks, January 30 – March 19, 2024, Atwater



Susan Sontag's *On Photography*, will be the textbook for this course as participants consider the photo and share some of those most meaningful to them.


Democracy at Risk? Disinformation in the Age of Social Media

Mondays, 6:15 p.m. to 8:15 p.m., Twelve weeks, Starting January 15, Atwater or Online The rise of social media in the twenty-first century has created a fertile environment for the propagation of false information and lies, what is often referred to as "disinformation." Whether taking the form of former President Trump's "big lie" of massive voter fraud or Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban's false accusations that George Soros was planning to flood Hungary with illegal immigrants, disinformation destabilizes democratic governments by using lies to support political parties more interested in gaining power than preserving democratic values. Such lies can be easily disseminated on social media by party supporters and foreign governments, making democratic populaces vulnerable to anti-democratic propaganda and their countries at risk of democratic backsliding.











TMI Volunteer Profile: A Conversation with Anne Fitzpatrick

Not long after we meet on a November evening in the Thomas More Institute conference room, I'm struck that I've encountered a soul whose whole is much greater than the sum of its parts and whose gregarious smile instantly draws me in.

Anne is an accomplished educator. We discuss her Masters concentration at McGill her favourite author Jane Austen. "She found her own way," Anne tells me. Although she wouldn't say it herself, it's clear, if her accompanying smile is any indication, that Austen's quiet determination and non-conformism are attributes Anne embraces. Then she relates the values of "conversation versus debate" first encountered when she was a 17-year-old college student at a Sacred Heart school near Boston.



Doctorate in hand in the 1970s and in the midst of the baby boom, she moved into a teaching position at Marianopolis College— "in the right place at the right time," she tells me. Serendipitously, the college was adjusting to accommodate the pre-university CEGEP model. "We set about designing and teaching humanities courses...it was something new."

Her interdisciplinary role was fostered by her English doctoral professor Phillip Stratford. "It was his range of interests that were a particular strength," she says. "Combining liberal arts with other areas...not just pulling things together" opened the doors to creative thinking and the hands-on role Anne played in the college's evolution. After Anne became associate dean in 1998, she "learned a great deal about student success and disappointment, student-faculty interaction, the role of advisors and counsellors," she recounts. This was a relatively recent position at the college, and it created the opportunity for renewed personal cooperation and ongoing learning. Our discussion takes on a philosophical nature as we remark on how even the smallest interaction can make a difference. Marianopolis Chair Sacha Haque recalled in the Marianopolis 2018 Millennium Foundation newsletter how, as an associate dean, Anne "set her on a career path that has led her to become General Counsel." Susan Anastasopoulos, a Marianopolis colleague whose teaching career parallels Anne's, talks of the esteem that Anne commanded. "She was well liked and respected at the college," Susan tells me and then recounts how Anne joined with two colleagues in proposing the Marianopolis Retiree Association and coordinating its bi-annual pot-luck celebrations.

Anne's involvement with Thomas More parallels her teaching career. She was among its youngest volunteers. "It's been part of my life since the late 1960s." But it's no coincidence that Anne has stayed with Thomas More for so long: there's a palpable synergy between Anne's sense of community and the Institute's maxims of open-ended discussions and cooperative learning. "Without much ado, we were leading courses—my first was *The Ballad*," she explains of the one she helped develop in her early twenties. She revisits familiar themes in our discussion— collaboration, continuity, the institute's communities, and of course how these experiences are mandatory ingredients in the Institute's recipe for success. "So much of what I learned about teaching I had absorbed from the Thomas More approach."

She tells me that her favourite course design is 2021's *Three Score and Ten*. It's the third installment to 1990s *The Pivot of Being 50* and 1970s *To Be 30*. Their content and continuity are telling of her persona: transformation, long-term commitment, and, like the course description for To Be 30, "vision and revision." Anne remarks on the amount of new program development that goes into the TMI experience. She asks me what the length of her tenure at the Institute says about her, but then answers her own question. "You come for the serious courses, but you stay for that and for the friendships."

Eventually, Anne assumed the TMI Board chair position in 1996, holding it for 12 years. Anne is currently the longestserving member of the Board, having joined it in the '60s and, with a few short breaks for life events, still serving in the 2020s. As we wrap up our meeting, Anne tells me of a recurring passion, that of watercolour painting. She hands me a greeting card with an image she had crafted—of a time-tested earthenware planter boasting fall flora in an explosion of autumn pastels. "It's a Dazzleberry," she explains with her lovely and gregarious smile.

October Events

Fall Webinar - October brought a fascinating discussion of medical assistance in dying during <u>the latest instalment of our webinar series</u>. Martin Baenninger and Christine Jamieson interviewed Dr. Eugene Bereza on the topic: "What Constitutes a Good Death? Exploring Questions around Medical Assistance in Dying." Dr. Bereza provided fascinating first-hand experience on the thought that went into Québec's pioneering of medical assistance in dying (MAID), followed by that of Canada. He spoke with great compassion of the suffering of the patients who seek to be treated under MAID, while also making clear that decisions concerning who should and should not qualify can be extremely challenging. It was a memorable conversation that showed the complexity and human urgency behind this question.

Book Launch - In November, TMI was proud to host the book launch of Art Historian Sandra Paikowsky's latest work, *James Wilson Morrice: Paintings and Drawings of Venice*. Anyone who has seen the Gallery Wall of paintings from TMI's Art Collection that Paikowsky selected and arranged in TMI's north classroom or who had the pleasure of hearing her speak about those paintings at our Fall Open House knows the passion Paikowsky brings to art history.

Paikowsky's book, organized around the places he painted, provides a beautiful tour of the city, and the author took us on our own mini tour. Venice, Paikowsky noted, taught Morrice to be a modernist painter. The comfort of Quebec and Paris were gone; there were no grand vistas in Venice to paint. Instead, Morrice gave us a sense of momentariness in these paintings, showing us Venice "at a glance," rather than "at a stare".



With the tight composition of his paintings, we are brought into "the honest representation of Morrice's own eye." They are cropped, but true. The evening left many of us eager to study Paikowsky's book and to rediscover Morrice's paintings of Venice at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts and at other Canadian museums.
